Since November 2022, I have been an in-house attorney at the Ford Motor Company. I am responsible for internal investigations into complaints of employee misconduct and potential violations of law or the company's code of conduct, or other ethical concerns.

For the previous 18 years, from 2004 to 2022, I served as an Assistant United States Attorney in Detroit, Michigan. I became an Assistant United States Attorney in 2004 and practiced civil litigation in a variety of areas, including defensive litigation and civil rights enforcement. I handled hundreds of cases at every stage of civil litigation from inception to post-judgment. I briefed and argued dozens of civil dispositive and non-dispositive motions, including motions to dismiss, compel, and obtain summary judgment. I took dozens of depositions and engaged in extensive discovery practice. I led substantial investigations, which included extensive interviews of fact and expert witnesses, factfinding, and recommendations. At any given time, I managed a revolving civil

caseload of approximately 25 to 30 cases. I also held several management positions. From 2014 to 2021, I served as the Chief of the Civil Rights Unit, supervising the work of the other attorneys in the Unit and spearheaded community outreach, as well as handling my own cases. In 2021, I became the Chief of the Civil Division, overseeing approximately 20 attorneys and 10 support staff in the Units within the Civil Division.

I was an associate at Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom, LLP from 2001 to 2004, primarily practicing in white collar defense and commercial litigation. I also worked on internal investigations and assisted clients in responding to government investigations.

In private practice as a law firm associate, I represented large corporations and corporate executives in commercial litigation and government investigations. At the United States Attorney's Office my clients were almost always the United States, federal agencies, and federal employees. I specialized in civil defensive litigation and civil enforcement of federal civil rights laws. At my current position at Ford Motor Company, my client is always the company. I specialize in corporate compliance, specifically investigating complaints of employee misconduct.

My practice has been primarily litigation and has been almost exclusively in the federal courts since 2001. I appeared in court frequently as an Assistant United States Attorney from 2004 to 2010, including for approximately 50 hearings on dispositive motions and two bench trials. When I transitioned into focusing on civil rights enforcement, my court appearances declined as most of my cases settled pre-suit.

This was the most recent of several cases that I handled alleging that a municipality violated the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act (RLUIPA) when it failed to approve a permit or other land use application submitted by a religious entity for religious use. From 2020 through 2022, I co-led the investigation and litigation into the City of Troy's denial of Adam Community Center's attempt to establish an Islamic place of worship in a building that had previously been used as a restaurant and banquet hall. I took several depositions during discovery and helped to write briefs on the parties' cross-

motions for summary judgment. I also participated in several settlement negotiations mediated by Magistrate Judge Majzoub. The Court ultimately granted summary judgment in favor of the United States, holding that Troy imposed a substantial burden on Adam's exercise of religion and that the city's zoning ordinance violated RLUIPA's equal terms provision by imposing more onerous restrictions on places of worship than comparable places of assembly, and requiring the city to approve the land use application and change its planning ordinance.

2. United States v. University of Michigan, Case No. 2:15-cv-12582 (E.D. Mich.) (Friedman, J.)

Along with co-counsel from the Civil Rights Division, from 2014 to 2015, I handled all aspects of this employment discrimination case against the University of Michigan for violations of Title I of the Americans with Disabilities Act. The case arose from an individual charge of discrimination by a maintenance employee at the University of Michigan who alleged that the University violated the Americans with Disabilities Act when it refused to re-assign her to a vacant position for which she was qualified after she was no longer able to perform the essential functions of her original job. My co-counsel and I conducted additional investigation and found evidence that the University engaged in a pattern or practice of discrimination by applying a policy that denied reassignments as a reasonable accommodation. Shortly after filing suit, the University agreed to settle the case based on the evidence that my co-counsel and I had developed during our supplemental investigation. Under the consent decree, which was approved by the District Court, the University agreed to pay damages to the original complainant and other similarly situated employees, as well as to change its policies and train its staff to

avoid future violations.

3. United States v. Pittsfield Charter Township, Case No. 2:15-cv-13779 (E.D. Mich.)

From approximately 2012 through 2015, I was the lead investigator and litigator in this religious land use case, but I continued to participate in the matter in a supervisory capacity until its resolution in 2016. In this case, Pittsfield Township had denied an Islamic school's request to amend the zoning ordinance to allow it to construct a new school on a vacant parcel located in a residential area. The school worked cooperatively with the Township Planning Department to come to a mutually acceptable design, and expressed a willingness to address every concern raised by the Township and neighbors. Nonetheless, the Township denied the request claiming traffic concerns and noise and light issues. I initiated and conducted the investigation leading up to suit, helped write the complaint and consent decree documents, and provided strategic advice and guidance on litigation and settlement strategy. The parties settled the case on terms favorable to the Islamic school through a consent order, which was approved by Judge Matthew F. Leitman.

4. United States v. Corral of Westland LLC, Case No. 02:13-cv-10717 (E.D. Mich.) (Murphy, J.)

I served as lead counsel on all proceedings in this civil rights case from 2011 to 2013. I represented the United States in this case against a buffet-style restaurant for violating the Americans with Disabilities Act when it denied a family service and ejected them from the restaurant based on the appearance of their children's skin caused by a genetic disorder. I conducted the investigation, wrote all court pleadings, and primarily handled the settlement negotiations in front of then-Magistrate Judge Laurie Michaelson. Defendants agreed to settle the case on terms requiring defendants to pay a substantial amount of money damages to the family, a civil monetary payment to the United States, and change their policies and conduct training for their employees to ensure future Americans with Disabilities Act compliance.

5. Baetz v. City of Highland Park, Case No. 2:12-cv-10617 (E.D. Mich.) (Borman, J.)

From 2011 to 2012, I handled all proceedings including pre-suit investigation in this case filed under the Uniformed Services Employment and Re-employment Rights Act of 1994 (USERRA) on behalf of a servicemember who was denied a promotion that he would have attained if he had not been called to active-duty military service. I represented an auxiliary firefighter who was also a member of the U.S. Army Reserve. He was called to active duty and deployed to Afghanistan for one year, and when he returned he learned that while he was gone, three auxiliary firefighters with less seniority than him had been promoted to full-time firefighters. I led extensive negotiations and the City eventually agreed to settle the case. As reflected in the consent judgment approved by the district court, the City agreed to, among other things, promote the plaintiff and retroactively adjust his promotion date to the date of his return from active-duty service, as well as pay money damages representing the amount of backpay and present value of union benefits that he would have received in the promotional position.

6. United States v. Tel-Clinton Trailer Courts, Inc., Case No. 2:11-cv-12886 (E.D. Mich.) (Tarnow, J.)

7. Estate of Berrien v. United States, Case No. 2:08-cv-13359 (E.D. Mich. Jan.13, 2012) (Roberts, J.), rev'd, 711 F.3d 654 (6th Cir. 2013).

I served as lead counsel in all district court proceedings and trial in this tort case from approximately 2008 to 2013. The case was brought by the estate of Mr. Berrien arising from Mr. Berrien's death from a head injury that he sustained while working at Selfridge Air National Guard Base as a maintenance contractor. There were no witnesses to the injury-producing event, but the plaintiff alleged that Mr. Berrien was struck on the head by a falling rain gutter. I represented the United States. I handled all of the discovery in the case, which lasted more than a year and included depositions of a large number of both fact and expert witnesses. I also wrote the briefs involved with cross-motions for summary judgment, and ultimately, a summary trial, which is a trial determined on written evidence only, before Judge Victoria Roberts. The district court found for the plaintiff but the government appealed the case, and ultimately prevailed at the Sixth Circuit. Although the Civil Appellate Section of the Department of Justice handled the appeal, I participated in the briefing and my work laid the foundation for the ultimate

decision in the United States' favor.

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8. Hoffman v. United States, Case No. 2:08-cv-12093 (E.D. Mich) (Steeh, J.)

In 2008, I was brought on to co-counsel the trial in this tort case arising out of an automobile accident. The plaintiff claimed injuries as a result of a vehicle driven by a government employee hitting the plaintiff's car on the freeway. Along with co-counsel, I participated in a settlement conference where the parties stipulated to the extent of the plaintiff's damages. In a bench trial before Judge George Caram Steeh, my co-counsel and I litigated the issue of liability for the collision. I gave the opening statement and examined the government driver. The verdict assigned 20 percent contributory negligence to the plaintiff.

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9. Phelps v. United States, Case No. 2:08-10957 (E.D. Mich.) (Gadola, J.)

From approximately 2007 to 2009, I primarily handled the litigation of this tort case, which involved claims of injury arising from a car accident with a United States Fish and Wildlife Service employee. Several issues were litigated, including the threshold issue of whether the employee was acting within the scope of his employment at the time of the collision. I conducted extensive discovery in the case, including document review, multiple depositions of fact and expert witnesses, and filed several motions and briefs. My colleague took over the case in 2009 when I went on maternity leave, and he eventually settled the case.

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10. Huling v. United States, Case No. 2:06-cv-14924 (E.D. Mich.) (Zatkoff, J.)

From 2006 to 2008, I handled all aspects of this automobile negligence case, brought against the United States under the Federal Tort Claims Act, arising out of a collision caused by a United States Postal employee. Although liability for the accident was not in dispute, the government contested the nature and extent of the injuries claimed by the plaintiff, Ms. Huling. I solely handled the extensive discovery in the case, which entailed exchanging a voluminous amount of documents and taking dozens of fact and expert witness depositions, including EMTs, medical doctors, and nursing professionals. Through the course of the case, the plaintiff claimed that prior to the car accident she had been in good health and worked part-time. However, based on records that I uncovered from the Social Security Administration and the Internal Revenue Service, I determined that the plaintiff had been using a different social security number to collect social security disability benefits for the past 10 years, while claiming injuries and symptoms identical to those being claimed in this lawsuit. I presented the evidence of the plaintiff's fraud to her attorney, who promptly withdrew as counsel. The case was eventually dismissed for failure to prosecute the case once plaintiff had her lies exposed. In addition, I notified the Social Security Administration so that they could start revocation proceedings and referred the matter to the criminal division of the United States Attorney's Office for a fraud prosecution.

As an Assistant United States Attorney and law firm associate, I also led the United States Attorney's Office's community outreach on civil rights matters, to educate community members on their civil rights and support community organization advocating for civil rights. I also took an active role in the hiring and development of new lawyers, participating in hiring, recruitment, and internship programs at both the United States Attorney's Office and my prior law firm.

Although almost all of my legal practice, until my current position, has been related to litigation, some of the most significant legal activities that I have pursued were significant cases which did not progress to trial or legal matters that did not involve litigation. These matters include representing Enron Corp in multiple investigations by law enforcement, Congress, and various federal agencies in the wake of the company's unexpected collapse, ensuring that the United States held the Detroit Police Department and the Detroit Department of Transportation to their agreed-upon reform commitments as established by consent decree to settle civil rights claims; and bringing the U.S. Department of Justice's first case to challenge a refusal to allow non-medical professionals to administer insulin to younger-than-school-aged children.

students at Wayne State University School of Law by being a judge for their mock appellate arguments.
