Dear Chairman Durbin and Ranking Member Graham:

We respectfully submit this letter in strong and unqualified support of the nomination of Micah W.J. Smith to the United States District Court for the District of Hawaii. We are all former prosecutors from the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York who had the pleasure of serving with Mr. Smith while he was an Assistant United States Attorney ("AUSA") and later a supervisor. Mr. Smith possesses an incisive legal mind, treats everyone he meets with humility and unparalleled kindness, and throughout his career has demonstrated a commitment to securing justice for all. In short, he has all the qualities that will make him an exceptional district court judge.

A graduate of Kauai High School, Mr. Smith went on to graduate magna cum laude from Harvard Law School. He then served as a law clerk for a judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit and for a justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. After working at a law firm, Mr. Smith joined the Southern District of New York U.S. Attorney's Office in 2012. There, he was quickly promoted to Acting Deputy Chief of Appeals and then Co-Chief of the Violent & Organized Crime Unit. In 2018, Mr. Smith returned to Hawaii and joined the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Hawaii. He has served in that Office as Deputy Chief of the Criminal Division, Chief of Appeals and Legal Strategy, and Criminal Civil Rights Coordinator.

Throughout his more than a decade of public service, Mr. Smith has earned the deep respect of his colleagues, his adversaries, members of the bench, and the public he has served. We all have experienced first-hand Mr. Smith's brilliant legal mind. Honed from his time at Harvard Law School, as a Supreme Court law clerk, and through his extensive trial and appellate experience, Mr. Smith possesses an exceptional ability to see to the core of complicated legal issues. He is a gifted trial and appellate lawyer who distills complex problems into eloquent courtroom advocacy. His writing is powerful and clear. It is no accident that his colleagues in two U.S. Attorney's Offices have trusted him to help solve their most difficult legal challenges.

Remarkably, Mr. Smith pairs his legal brilliance with an equally brilliant ability to relate to everyone he encounters. As a New York City violent crimes prosecutor, Mr. Smith earned the trust of a diverse array of victims, witnesses, law enforcement agents, and defendants by treating everyone with honesty, respect, and compassion. He made countless cases by convincing victims and witnesses, who often came from disadvantaged communities, that he understood their problems and how to solve them. His numerous trial-court accomplishments demonstrate

his ability to connect with jurors from all walks of life. Mr. Smith is soft-spoken yet powerful. He is calm and even-tempered yet passionate. He is humble yet commands respect. As a supervisor and colleague, Mr. Smith's humility was on display when others sought his counsel. Despite his mastery of the law and his experience, Mr. Smith was an excellent listener who was always open to the possibility he was wrong (even if that was rarely the case). He deftly guided others to the right answer while making everyone feel heard.

To his great credit, Mr. Smith has used these skills not to promote himself but to serve others. He has dedicated his legal career to protecting the public, seeking justice for crime victims, and upholding the Rule of Law. Working with him on difficult, emotional cases, we have all witnessed his impeccable judgment, commitment to excellence, and unwavering integrity. Mr. Smith's goal was never to win the case but, in the finest traditions of the U.S. Attorney's Office, to do the right thing. We trusted his judgment because he never put himself first; instead, doing justice was the only thing that mattered.

Mr. Smith's legal skills, calm temperament, respect for others, and commitment to doing the right thing will make him an outstanding District Court Judge.

In the Southern District U.S. Attorney's Office, Mr. Smith inspired his colleagues and those he supervised with his example. He was a credit to the institution, adhering to its highest values at all times. We have no doubt he will do the same as a District Court Judge for the District of Hawaii, and we strongly support his nomination.
