I have the pleasure of providing this letter of support for Professor Sarah Russell of Quinnipiac University's School of Law for an appointment to the United States District Court. I currently serve as the senior assistant state's attorney at the Hartford Connecticut Community Court and have previously served as the State's Undersecretary of Criminal Justice Policy and Planning in the Office of Policy and Management under Governor M. She consistently respected the rule of law and demonstrated the qualities that are necessary for a member of the judiciary.

Further, on many occasions I had the opportunity to see Professor Russell work with her students on Commission projects. I was particularly impressed with her work ethic and ability to work well with all of the students that she taught and supervised in her clinical settings. She was always very approachable and respectful of their opinions.
