The Husers claimed the resulting retaining wall and construction by the Zaveris caused damage to their neighboring property. Following a multi-day jury trial, a verdict was entered finding the Zaveris improperly built the structure and caused damage to the Husers, but the jury found the City of Lake Charles was only 2% at fault for issuing the building permit.
